Dear Speaker Johnson, and Leaders Thune, Schumer, and Jeffries:

We, the undersigned organizations, urge swift passage of pharmacy benefit manager (PBM) reforms to reduce Americans' prescription drug costs and protect patients and their local pharmacies across the United States.

These bipartisan, bicameral PBM reforms—estimated to save nearly \$5 billion—were agreed on in negotiations over the December 2024 continuing resolution and had been approved by the committees of jurisdiction^{1,2}. This Congress, these reforms have been reintroduced in one legislative package in the House as H.R. 4317, the *PBM Reform Act* and two companion measures in the Senate as S.927, the *Protecting Pharmacies in Medicaid Act*, and as S. 882, the *Patients Before Middlemen Act*. This legislation includes policies that would lower drug costs by delinking drug prices from PBM revenues, mandating the negotiated savings go to employers, workers and their families; would save significant taxpayer dollars by banning spread pricing in Medicaid; would support pharmacies' ability to serve patients by enforcing reasonable and relevant contracts in Medicare Part D; and would shine a light on PBM practices by requiring transparency from the corporations that have persistently resisted it.

These all support the same underlying goal – to address the PBMs anti-competitive, anti-consumer practices. These provisions received overwhelming support in both parties and in both chambers of Congress. By enacting these measures, you can deliver relief to patients and families at their local pharmacy counter, employers facing continued increases in health care costs, and taxpayers who are currently overpaying for government-provided benefit programs.

The American public is tired of losing access to their local health care providers and of paying too much out-of-pocket for the medicines they need. This problem is particularly egregious as the Federal Trade Commission recently found that the PBMs generated over \$7.3 billion³ in revenue from 2017 to 2022,

yet nearly one in three retail pharmacies have closed since 2010⁴, with more closure notices coming every day. Pharmacists are some of the most accessible and trusted health care professionals in America, with patients—particularly in rural and underserved communities—reliant on their training and expertise.

We urge you to prioritize PBM reform this fall and ensure these bipartisan efforts are enacted into law without delay. Immediate action is needed to address these harmful practices. Americans deserve and expect protection from inflated prescription drug costs, from forced pharmacy closures, and from barriers to their pharmacy of choice that result from PBM tactics.
